



### SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

In the 2006/2007 work year, a new vista in family medicine unfolded with the establishment of the first family medicine department in a hospital. The Family Medicine Continuing Care (FMCC) department in the Singapore General Hospital was inaugurated in May 2006. The College was involved in this initiative through its representation in the Steering Committee of Family Medicine Continuing Care, Singapore General Hospital.

The FMCC department aspires to tackle the need for integrated care between hospital and primary care, provide better care co-ordination in patients with multiple medical conditions with regards to rationalising polypharmacy, discharge planning, right siting of chronic disease management and making more effective use of community resources.

The 2006/2007 work year, although not an election year for the College, witnessed a change of Presidency. During the 33rd Annual General Meeting in June 2006, the incumbent President, A/Prof Cheong Pak Yean, announced that Vice President, A/Prof Goh Lee Gan, had agreed to complete the rest of the 20th College Council term as President whilst A/Prof Cheong shall take his place as Vice President. A/Prof Cheong was President for five years from May 2001. A/Prof Cheong felt the change in portfolio will put the College in a good position to host the Wonca World Conference in July 2007 as A/Prof Goh is no stranger to the Wonca world. A/Prof Goh is currently Wonca's Regional President of the Asia Pacific region and also a member of its World Executive Committee.

The year 2006 was also significant because in October, the Ministry of Health announced the Medisave for Chronic Disease Management Programme on an outpatient basis starting with diabetes in October 2006 and extending to hypertension, stroke, and hyperlipidaemia from January 2007.

# **Graduate Diploma in Family Medicine**

 A 1-hour key feature problem theory paper
 A 2-hour Objective Structured Clinical Examination (OSCE)

# MCFP(S) by Assessment and the College Professional Development Programme (CPDP)

The MCFP(S) by Assessment award was mooted to upgrade existing criteria for award of the Collegiate membership and bring it in line with international standards and the global trend of award by objective assessment and validation of training.

Entry requirement is the attainment of the GDFM or equivalent academic degree, professional good standing and Ordinary membership of the College for at least two years.

The CPDP programme, which leads to the award by assessment, comprises a course of three modules and the normal duration of the programme is two years. Completion within one year is allowed if the candidate can complete the modules within a year.

### The modules are:

- Consulting, Communication and Counseling Skills Course
- Clinical Quality Skills Course
- Professional Development Project

A summative assessment is carried out at the end of the programme, and successful candidates will be awarded the MCFP(S).

The inaugural batch of candidates for the MCFP(S) by assessment programme commenced their CPDP in academic year 2004. Nine of the ten candidates exited their programme successfully in May 2006 and were conferred the MCFP(S) award at the Family Medicine Convocation Ceremony held on 4th Nov 2006.

# Institute of Family Medicine

The Institute of Family Medicine was formed in 2001 in response to the felt need for sustainable action to develop training activities.

The role of the IFM is to develop the academic programmes of the College, such as the Family Medicine Modular Course which is the core component of both the MMed(FM) and the GDFM, the Family Practice Skills Course, and the E-Learning programme. It serves as the think tank in family medicine training.

In the year under review, it continued to be headed by A/Prof Goh Lee Gan as its Director. He is assisted by a panel of seven other part time teaching fellows, namely Dr Julian Lim, Dr Kwong Kum Hoong, Dr Ong Chooi Peng, Dr Jonathan Pang Sze Kang, Dr Tan Yew Seng, Dr Michael Yee, Dr Wong Ted Min and Dr Moira Goh (resigned as of January 2007). Dr Lee Kheng Hock resigned as a Senior Teaching Fellow in May 2006 to take up his appointment as head of the FMCC department in Singapore General Hospital.

During the year, the IFM reviewed, updated and edited the notes for the Family Medicine Modular Course (FMMC) to make them more relevant and user friendly to the course participants. An E-Learning component for each module was also introduced, consisting of therapeutic notes, case scenarios, assessment by MCQs and a case review to be put up by a tutorial group.

The IFM also oversees the Family Medicine Fellowship Programme, the Family Medicine Membership Programme and the Graduate Diploma in Family Medicine.

# **Continuing Medical Education**

The College is represented by Dr Lee Kheng Hock and Dr Matthew Ng in the SMC CME Co-ordinating Committee and works closely with the Singapore Medical Council to ensure that the quality of the CME events is acceptable. It continues to advise the SMC on the accreditation of core family medicine CME events through its panel of FM CME advisors appointed by the College.

# **E-Learning**

The E-Learning programme launched in 2003 has been incorporated into the GDFM training programme. An E-Learning component for each module was introduced, consisting of therapeutic notes, case scenarios, assessment by MCQs and a case review to be put up by a tutorial group.

# **Family Practice Skills Course**

The Family Practice Skills Course was first started in October 2002 in response to the need for suitable Continuing Medical Education (CME) activities for family physicians to meet the 25 CME points per year required by the Singapore Medical Council (SMC).

Since 2002, we have conducted 21 of such courses.

### THE COMPONENTS OF FPSC

The components of a skill course may include one or more of the following:

- 1. Distance Learning with verification (6 CME points)
- 2. Seminars (4 CME points 2 CME points for each seminar of 3 lectures)
- 3. Workshop (max. of 2 CME points)
- 4. Small group activities including clinical attachments, tutorials, ward-rounds
- 5. Assessments which can be written, oral, demonstration and/or clinical (for some courses)

A typical FPSC template is a course with six units of distance learning with verification of 30 MCQs, two seminars, and one workshop conducted over two afternoon sessions, e.g. one Saturday afternoon and Sunday afternoon, or two Saturday afternoons.

# Commencement of Academic Year 2006

As usual, this academic year was inaugurated with a Commencement Ceremony which was held on 1st July 2006. The Guest of Honour was Prof Satkunanantham.

Prof Satku's speech centred on the aspirations of many to advance their medical knowledge and the resultant overwhelming demand for the GDFM. He expressed the hope that good primary care in Singapore could provide the solution to the problems of an aging population and play a major role in the prevention of chronic diseases.

There were 113 GDFM (a record), 8 MMed (FM) Programme B, and 11 MMed(FM) Programme A trainees registered.

# **Convocation 2006**

The Family Medicine Convocation Ceremony was held on 4th November 2006. The Guest of Honour was Mr Heng Chee How, Minister of State, Ministry of Health. His keynote address was on "MediSave for Chronic Disease Programme".

In this ceremony, 22 doctors were conferred the MCFP(S) and 2 the FCFP(S); 20 GDFM graduates and 20 MMed (FM) graduates (2005 and 2006) were recognised.



# **GP Flu Pandemic Symposium**

In May 2006, CFPS, SMA, MOH, SingHealth Polyclinic and NHG Polyclinic held a "GP Flu Pandemic Symposium" at the MOH Auditorium.

Prof James Arthur Dickinson who participated in the pandemic flu symposium was invited to the College to give a talk on family medicine research.

# Family Practice Hospital Model

In August 2006, the College and SGH jointly organised a lecture titled "Family Practice Hospital Model in the Calgary Health Region – A Proven Model of Care". This lecture was delivered by Dr Peter C Jamieson, the Division Chief of Acute Care Family Medicine of the Calgary Health Region which has a cluster of five hospitals and an integrated network of community and long term care facilities. It serves a population of 1.4 million. He is also Clinical Associate Professor at University of Calgary.

Following the lecture was a Panel Discussion on "The Hospitalist Care Model in Singapore: The Possibilities and Challenges". The panel members were Dr Peter Jamieson, Prof Tay Boon Keng, Prof Ng Han Siong, Prof Ong Yong Yau, A/Prof Goh Lee Gan, A/Prof Cheong Pak Yean, Dr Tan Chee Beng and Dr Lee Kheng Hock.

Among the audience were Ms Yong Ying-I, Permanent Secretary, MOH, Dr Lee Suan Yew, past President of the College and SMC, and Dr Ling Sing Lin, Deputy Director, Medical Services, MOH.

### THE GRADUATE DIPLOMA OF FAMILY MEDICINE (GDFM) EXAMINATION 2006

### **TERMS OF REFERENCE**

This Committee was set up in July 2001 with the following terms of reference:

- 1. To advise the College Council on developments in Family Medicine in the international scene;
- To implement activities decided by Wonca World & Wonca Asia Pacific Region;
- 3. To implement bilateral activities in Family Medicine teaching, research and practice.

# **DEVELOPMENTS IN THE INTERNATIONAL SCENE**

In the year under review, there have been developments in Family Medicine in the international scene. Chief of these is the ASEAN Community's desire under the leadership of Indonesia to work towards common practice standards across ASEAN countries.

# First ASEAN Regional Primary Care Conference (ARPaC)

At the first ASEAN Regional Primary Care Conference held in Kuala Lumpur from 7 to 10 February 2007, a Declaration (salient points listed below) was made for the purpose of further discussion by the General Practitioners/Family Physicians in the ASEAN Region:

- 1. To collaborate in sharing knowledge, skills, educational and research resources;
- To work with the ASEAN Secretariat and the Médical Association of South East Asian Nations and other organisations as it may deem fit;
- 3. To work with Ministry of Health in their own countries;
- 4. To work with medical colleges, universities and academies of professional bodies to establish postgraduate educational programs for primary care doctors and to advocate the inclusion of general practice/family medicine in undergraduate medical programs;
- 5. To adopt and establish the name of "ASEAN REGIONAL PRIMARY CARE CONFERENCE", with acronym "ARPaC CONFERENCE;
- To set up a steering committee of members from each nation and to elect a Chairman, the first being from Indonesia and to rotate the chair every two years;
- 7. To work towards common standards for quality healthcare, education, training, accreditation and certification to set competencies for general practitioners/family physicians;
- 8. To uphold the level of professionalism to meet public expectations.

# **WONCA ACTIVITIES**

The College of Family Physicians Singapore will host the 18th Wonca World Conference from 24 to 27 July. The theme of the Conference is Genomics and Family Medicine. The attendance is expected to be near 2,000 delegates. The Conference has 2 keynote addresses, 8 plenary lectures, 28 symposia, 25 workshops, and 565 free papers. The total number of papers to be presented at this Conference will be 715. The delegates come from more than 50 countries.

### **BILATERAL COUNTRY ACTIVITIES**

A SIF-Indonesia Ministry of Health Family Medicine Study Trip was organised by SIF with A/Prof Goh Lee Gan as the expert person in Family Medicine from 18 to 22 April. The study topics covered workshop teaching for trainers on child's health, women's health, and elderly health. The Indonesians also took the opportunity to discuss the two tier national programme for family medicine qualification that they will implement in the near future.

### **CONCLUSIONS**

It has been a productive year for the College in the International forum of family medicine activities.

The Family Medicine posting continues to be a 4-week posting. The first two weeks were spent in the GP setting and the second two weeks in the Polyclinic setting. # REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

The College is financially very sound during the past year. Increased participation in our GDFM and our Family Practice Skills Course, which is fully sponsored by the various resource partners, is due to the fact that they are well accepted structured continuing professional education programmes. These basic core activities provide the fuel that drives the College.

The College also had to content with additional budget from the engines of the Joint Committee of Family Medicine Training (JCFMT) Secretariat, and to witness the smooth passing of the baton as the old team of the Secretariat, led by Senior Executive, Ms Emily Foo, and Executive Director, Dr Lee Kheng Hock, made way for the bigger new team headed by Manager, Ms Sim Siew Ching and Executive Director, Dr Cheng Heng Lee.

Hence, with vigilant and prudent administration of the Treasury, the College recorded an accumulated surplus of \$509,404.00 brought about by a record gross revenue of \$975,149.00, and expenditure of \$465,745.00. While revenue had increased, there was a conscious effort by the Secretariat to curb expenditure, resulting in a decrease in the amount expensed for this year.

Having been an Institute of Public Character, and now a non-profit organisation, the financial investment policy of the Treasury has been very conservative and risk-adverse. It is mainly from interests generated by fixed term deposits. There is little emphasis on investment income, avoiding the more risk-exposed equity and financial investment products. As the Treasury grows, and with an unexpectedly large surplus from the Wonca World Conference in July 2007, College will have to look into more avenues for investment, to reflect a more dynamic investment portfolio.

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the College of Family Physicians Singapore, which comprise the balance sheet as at 31 March 2007, the income and expenditure statement, statement of changes in accumulated fund, miscellaneous funds and revaluation reserve and cash flow statement for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes.

# Managements' Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The Management Committee of the College of Family Physicians Singapore is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Singapore Financial Reporting Standards. This responsibility includes: designing, implementing and maintaining internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error; selecting and applying appropriate accounting policies; and making accounting estimates that are reasonable in the circumstances.

In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management committee, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

# SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES 2)

#### Basis of accounting 2.1

The financial statements of the College have been prepared in accordance with Singapore Financial Reporting Standards (FRS).

The financial statements of the College which are expressed in Singapore dollars, are prepared on the historical cost basis.

In the current financial year, the College has adopted all the new and revised FRSs and INT FRS issued by the Council on Corporate Disclosure and Governance that are relevant to its operations and effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2006. The adoption of these new/revised FRSs and INT FRSs has no material effect on the financial statements.

#### Basis of presentation 2.2

The fund accounts which are created for the purpose of assets creation are included under miscellaneous and accumulated funds of the College.

The management committee expects that the adoption of the above pronouncements will have no material impact to the financial statements in the period of initial application, except for FRS 107 and the amendments to FRS 1 as indicated below.

### FRS 107, Financial Instruments: Disclosures and amendment to FRS 1 (revised), Presentation of financial statements (Capital Disclosures)

FRS 107 introduces new disclosures to improve the information about financial instruments. It requires the disclosure of qualitative and quantitative information about exposure to risks arising from financial instruments, including specified minimum disclosures about credit risk, liquidity risk and market risk, including sensitivity analysis to market The amendment to FRS 1 requires the company to make new disclosures to enable users of the financial statements to evaluate the company's objectives, policies and processes for managing capital. The company will apply FRS 107 and the amendment to FRS 1 from annual period beginning 1 January 2007.

#### 2.4 Significant accounting estimates and judgements

Estimates, assumptions concerning the future and judgements are made in the preparation of the financial statements. They affect the application of the College of Family Physicians Singapore's accounting policies, reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses, and disclosures made. They are assessed on an on-going basis and are based on experience and relevant factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

# 2.4 Significant accounting estimates and judgements (continued)

Key sources of estimation of uncertainty

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation of uncertainty at the balance sheet date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year is discussed below.

Depreciation of plant and equipment

The cost of plant and equipment is depreciated on a straight line basis over the plant and equipment's useful lives. Management estimates the useful lives of these plant and equipment to be within 1 to 5 years. These are common life expectancies applied in the similar industry. The carrying amount of the College's plant and equipment at 31 March 2007 was \$51,329 (2006: \$37,780). Changes in the expected level of usage and technological developments could impact the economic useful lives and the residual values of these assets, therefore future depreciation charges could be revised.

## 2.5 Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any impairment in value. All items of plant and equipment are initially recorded at cost.

The initial cost of plant and equipment comprises its purchase price, including import duties and non-refundable purchase taxes and any directly attributable costs of bringing the asset to its working condition and location for its intended use, any trade discounts and rebates are deducted in arriving at the purchase price. Expenditure incurred after the plant and equipment have been put into operation, such as repairs and maintenance and overhaul costs, is normally charged to the Income and Expenditure statement in the period in which the costs are incurred. In situations where it can be clearly demonstrated that the expenditure has resulted in an increase in the future economic benefits expected to be obtained from the use of an item of plant and equipment beyond its originally assessed standard of performance, the expenditure is capitalized as an additional cost of plant and equipment.

All plant and equipment are depreciated on a straight line method over their expected useful lives. The rates used to depreciate the assets are as follows:

### 2.5 Plant and equipment (continued)

Other assets include painting, potteries, tapes, library books and other minor assets.

No depreciation is provided for paintings and potteries as they appreciate in value.

#### 2.6 Revenue recognition

Revenue consisting of subscriptions, course fees and advertisements are recognised in the financial statements on accrual basis. Donations are recognised on cash basis.

Interest on fixed deposits are taken into account on accrual basis. Fixed deposit interest attributable to the various funds are apportioned to the respective funds.

#### 2.7 Impairment of assets

The carrying amounts of the College's assets are reviewed at each balance sheet date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists, the asset's recoverable amount is estimated.

An impairment loss is recognized whenever the carrying amount of an asset or its cash-generating unit exceeds is recoverable amount. An impairment loss in respect of assets carried at revalued amount is recognised in the same way as a revaluation decrease. All other impairment losses are recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

#### 2.8 Reversal of impairment loss

An impairment loss is reversed if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount. An impairment loss is reversed only to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation or amortization, if no impairment loss has been recognized. A reversal of an impairment loss in respect of assets carried at revalued amount is recognized in the same way as a revaluation increase. All other reversals of impairment are recognized in the income and expenditure statement.

## 2) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

#### 2.9 Grants and sponsorship

Grants are recognised at their fair value where there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attaching conditions will be complied with. When the grant relates to an expense item, it is recognised in the Income and Expenditure Statement over the periods necessary to match them on a systematic basis, to the costs, which it is intended to compensate. Where the grant relates to an asset, the fair value is credited to a deferred income account and is released to the Income and Expenditure Statement over the expected useful life of the relevant asset by equal annual instalments.

#### 2.10 Employee benefits

Defined contribution plans

The College participates in the national pension schemes as defined by the laws of Singapore in which it has operations. In particular, the College makes contributions to the Central Provident Fund scheme in Singapore, a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions to national pension schemes are recognized as an expense in the period in which the related service is performed.

Employee leave entitlement

Employee entitlements to annual leave are recognized as a liability when they accrue to employees. The estimated liability for leave is recognized for services rendered by employees up to balance sheet date.

#### 2.11 Wonca Account

Wonca conference and exhibition is to be held by Wonca 2007 Host Organising Committee in July 2007. Revenue mainly consist of donations, sponsorship and delegate registration fee, while expenditure includes largely of advertisement, marketing, venue rental and conference organizers management fees. All revenue and expenses will be deferred till the conference and exhibition take place in July 2007.

#### 19) RISK MANAGEMENT

The main risks arising from the College's financial management are interest rate risk, credit risk and liquidity risk. The Council reviews and agrees policies for managing each of these risks and they are summarised below:

#### Interest rate risk

The College is exposed to interest rate risk through the impact of rate changes on fixed deposits.

#### Credit risk

The College involves the risk that counterparties may be unable to meet the terms of their agreements. The College has no major concentration of credit risk.

The College places its cash and fixed deposits with creditworthy institutions.

The carrying amount of financial assets recorded in the financial statements, net of any provision of losses, represents the College's maximum exposure to credit risk.

#### Liquidity risk

In July 2006, the 20th Council agreed that a review of the existing Finance and Accounting system at the College was opportune as new Financial Reporting Standards had been introduced.

The College receives funding from the Ministry of Health and is accountable to the membership for judicious use of membership fees and other fees collected from courses organised by the College. In addition, the College receives donations and sponsorships from supporters like the Health Promotion Board and pharmaceutical companies. A system with proper accounting and governance needs to be in place.

A closed tender was called in July 2006 and three companies were invited to quote for this exercise.

The tender was awarded to Lo Hock Ling Consulting Pte Ltd at a cost of \$8,132 for a complete review and recommendations to ensure the College puts in place strict governance measures and complies with all necessary regulations.

In addition, the consultant was to recommend a software that would meet the needs of the College in complying with these governance matters and regulations.

A detailed report had been received. No evidence of any fraud or unprofessional conduct had been unearthed. However, several measures had been recommended to improve our governance and prevent the possibility of such events taking place. These measures are being implemented by the College Secretariat under the supervision of Honorary Treasurer and Executive Director.

A new accounting software was recommended. The "Sage Accpac ERP 100 Small Business Edition" was found to be suitable to meet the needs of the College and our staff had prior experience using this software; thus, allowing fairly easy implementation. The total cost of this exercise amounted to \$15,225 including software installation, deployment, and training. A further \$10,080 was spent to upgrade the hardware as our previous hardware was too old and was not able to run this system.
