

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS 2009



Welcome to the Annual General Meeting 2009. This is the election year and the membership will be electing the office bearers of the Twenty-second Council. The Twenty-first Council's term, 2007 to 2009, had been quietly eventful. The report card is given below.

WORK OF THE TWENTY-FIRST COUNCIL

In the year under review, the College Council continued to make progress with the core activities of the College, dealt with ongoing and new government policies in practice matters, as well as managed the administration of the College Secretariat.

I would like to place on record my acknowledgment to the many family physicians who contributed as members of the Council, trainers in the various educational programmes of the College, committees, and work groups. Thanks are also due to the College Secretariat staff for their contributions in the administration of the training programmes, the College Council meetings and matters arising, as well as developmental matters of the College like the renovation of the College made necessary because of the MOH's need for space.

College's core business

The following activities were dealt with through the office of the Executive Director, the Institute of Family Medicine, and the College matrix administrative structure.

- (1) Singapore Family Physician and Family Practice Skills Courses. In the two years, 5 issues of the Singapore Family Physician were produced. Each carried a Family Practice Skills Course aimed at providing the continuing professional development of our family physicians.
- (2) GDFM, MMed (FM), FCFP programmes. These programmes were conducted through the Institute of Family Medicine.
 - (a) The Graduate Diploma in Family Medicine. We had an enrolment of 100 doctors in 2008 and in the new batch for 2009-2011 we have an enrolment of 101 doctors.
 - (b) The MMed (FM) programmes. The College was directly involved training the Programme B candidates with the assistance of the training faculty from the Department of Family Medicine and Continuing Care, Singapore General Hospital, and also contributions from colleagues in the other hospitals. We had an enrolment of 13 trainees in the programme for 2008. The College also co-ordinate the group teaching sessions for the combined Programme A and Programme B trainees. In 2008, there were 33 trainees in Programme A.
 - (c) FCFP Programme. This is a two-year programme. In 2008, 14 trainees registered. From the 2007 batch, 9 will be sitting for their Exit Examination in July-August this year.

Practice related matters feedback

In the term of office of the Council, College participated in the feedback on the following Government / MOH matters: (1) The HINI-2009 Influenza outbreak pandemic preparedness, (2) Medical Registration Act, (3) Foreign graduates direct entry into the proposed Family Physician Register, (4) Integration of health care, (5) Aesthetic practice oversight, (6) Family Medicine training scheme for conditional registration doctors, (7) Mental Capacity Bill, and (8) Coroners' Bill.

College administrative matters

The College administration functioned well with the matrix organization of activities headed by the Executive Director and Honorary Secretary. In the year under review, the College tenancy agreement with MOH was extended for another three years and renovation was required because of the need to return part of the space occupied by the College to MOH.A College Building Committee was also formed. The administration of JCFMT was handed back to MOH.

TASKS OF THE INCOMING COUNCIL

The important tasks for the incoming Council among others will be: (1) the continuing effort to strengthen the recognition of the equitable worth of family physician by the public, press, policy makers, and profession; (2) the setting up of the accredited modular course programme for senior family physicians to meet the requirements of the Family Physician Register; and (3) the preparation and operational development needed for the continued implementation of the right siting of patients.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMMES: RECIPIENTS OF AWARDS/GRADUATES (2008)

Graduate Diploma in Family Medicine

The Graduate Diploma in Family Medicine (GDFM) is a vocational training certification for primary care doctors. The aim of this 2-year part-time trainee programme is to train primary care doctors to practise Family Medicine at an enhanced level to meet the needs of the child, the adolescent, the adult and the elderly. The course emphasises on basic clinical diagnostic and management skills essential to general practice.

The programme is planned to accommodate the busy doctor's schedule as almost all courses that require in-person attendance are conducted outside regular office hours. The course consists of the following:

- 8 modules of Family Medicine Modular Course (FMMC) with each comprising of 4 workshops (2 1/2 hrs each), 1 tutorial (1hr each), online case studies and multiple choice assessments
- 4 Practice Management Courses (9hrs in all) and 1 elective Family Practice Skills Course (6 hrs)

The examination is conducted by DGMS, NUS and consists of :

- Written paper Applied Knowledge Test /MCQ (2 hrs); Key Features Problems Paper (2 hrs)
- Skills Assessment in the Objective Structured Clinical Examination (OSCE), (2 hrs)

The GDFM (Singapore) is recognised by the Singapore Medical Council as a registrable medical qualification.

Master of Medicine (Family Medicine)

There are currently two programmes to prepare doctors for the MMed (FM) examinations.

Programme A is a 3-year hospital and polyclinic based training programme generally for the younger doctors who have been awarded the Family Medicine traineeship. Within the 3 years the trainee must also complete the Family Medicine Modular Course conducted by the College.

Programme B is a structured training programme designed for mature practising family physicians in Singapore.

It is jointly organised by the College of Family Physicians Singapore and the Division of Graduate Medical Studies, National University of Singapore.

This 1-year part-time course provides a comprehensive and structured training programme for doctors working in primary care who have completed the 8 modules of the Family Medicine Modular Course (FMMC) to prepare them to sit for the MMed (FM) examinations.

The MMed (FM) examination is conducted by the DGMS, NUS and consists of:

- Written paper MEQ, Essay, SAQ, Talk
- MCO
- Slide interpretation
- Oral examination
- Clinical examination

Albert and Mary Lim Award

CONTINUING PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT / MEDICAL EDUCATION PROGRAMMES AND COURSES

The College promotes CPD and CME through the Family Medicine Modular Course, Family Practice Skills Course, MMed (Family Medicine) Programme B, Family Medicine Membership and Fellowship Programme.

The Institute of Family Medicine, an organ within the College, plays a significant role in developing the contents and syllabi of these programmes and courses.

During the year the IFM reviewed, updated and edited the notes as well as their e-learning components for Module 8, 1, 2, and 3 of the Family Medicine Modular Course to make them more relevant and user friendly to the course participants

The Family Medicine Modular Course consists of 8 modules of knowledge acquisition and is a requirement for doctors who are preparing for the Graduate Diploma in Family Medicine(GDFM) Programme and the Master of Medicine (Family Medicine) Programme A. Each year four modules are covered.

The notes for the modules are on the College's e-learning website and can be downloaded by the Family Medicine trainees. By having them online, the trainees can refer to these notes twenty-four hours a day

For the year April 2008-Mar 2009 there were 100 trainees registered in the GDFM course, 33 trainees in the MMed (FM) Prog A, 13 trainees in the MMed (FM) Prog B and 14 trainees in the Family Medicine Fellowship Programme.

Family Practice Skills Course (FPSC)

During the year the College conducted five Family Practice Skills Courses.

The components of a skill course may include one or more of the following:

- 1. Distance Learning with verification (6 CME points)
- 2. Lectures (max of 2 CME points I point for each seminar of 3 lectures)
- 3. Workshop (2 CME points)
- 4. Small group activities including clinical attachments, tutorials, ward-rounds
- 5. Assessments which can be written, oral, demonstration and/or clinical (for some courses)

A typical FPSC template is a course with six units of distance learning with verification of 30 MCQs, two seminars, and one workshop conducted over two afternoon sessions e.g., one Saturday afternoon and Sunday afternoon or two Saturday afternoons.

E-Learning

The E-Learning programme launched in 2003 has been incorporated into the GDFM training programme. An E-Learning component for each module was introduced, consisting of therapeutic notes, case scenarios, assessment by MCQs and a case review to be put up by a tutorial group.

Accreditation of core CME points

The College is represented by Dr Lee Kheng Hock and Dr Jonathan Pang in the SMC Maintenance of Competency Committee and Dr Lee Kheng Hock and Dr Matthew Ng in the SMC CME Co-ordinating Committee. The College works closely with the Singapore Medical Council to ensure that the quality of the CME events is acceptable. It continues to advise the SMC on the accreditation of core family medicine CME events through its panel of FM CME advisors appointed by the College.

Family Practice Skills Course (FPSC)

The Family Practice Skills Courses serve the continuing professional development needs of the General Practitioner / Family Physician. We are able to run at least one course a guarter. See Table 2.

The components of a skill course may include one or more of the following:

- I. Distance Learning with verification (6 CME points)
- 2. Lectures (max of 2 CME points I point for each seminar of 3 lectures)
- 3. Workshop (2 CME points)
- 4. Small group activities including clinical attachments, tutorials, ward-rounds
- 5. Assessments which can be written, oral, demonstration and/or clinical (for some courses)

A typical FPSC template is a course with six units of distance learning with verification of 30 MCQs, two seminars, and one workshop conducted over two afternoon sessions e.g., one Saturday afternoon and Sunday afternoon.

During the year the College conducted 6 Family Practice Skills Courses.

The College is on a sound financial footing during the period I April 2008 to 31 March 2009.

Revenue from our courses and seminars contributed to 48.6% of our total revenue while sponsorships contributed 19.9% to our total revenue. Subscriptions contributed 18.4%. These 3 items together account for close to 87% of our revenue. College recorded an accumulated surplus of \$621,622 brought about by a gross revenue of \$1,146,224 and an expenditure of \$524,602.

As the college is a not-for-profit organisation, its financial investment policy is conservative and risk-adverse. In this respect the College relies mainly on interests generated by fixed term deposits.

The financial statements were authorised for issue by the Management on 29 May 2009.

1) DOMICILE AND ACTIVITIES

The College of Family Physicians Singapore (the College) is registered in the Republic of Singapore under the Societies Act Cap 151 and has its registered office and principal place of business at:

16 College Road # 01-02 College of Medicine Building Singapore 169854

The principal activities of the College are:

- i) Advance the art and science of medicine.
- ii) Discuss medical and scientific problems
- iii) Assist in providing post graduate study courses
- iv) Arrange for and/or provide instructions for undergraduate or post graduate students
- v) Promote and maintain high standards of family practice of medicine.

2) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Singapore Financial Reporting Standards ("FRS").

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, except for the following assets and liabilities which are measured at fair value: certain plant and equipment, certain financial assets and financial liabilities.

The financial statements are presented in Singapore Dollars which is the College's functional currency.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with FRS requires managements to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future periods affected.

2) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

2.1 Basis of preparation (continued)

The fund accounts which are created for the purpose of assets creation are include under miscellaneous and accumulated funds of the College.

New accounting standards and interpretations not yet adopted (continued)

FRS 1 (revised 2008) will become effective for the College's financial statements for the year ending 31March 2009. The revised standard requires an entity to present, in a statement of changes in equity, all owner changes in equity. All non-owner changes in equity (i.e. comprehensive income) are required to be presented in one statement of comprehensive income or in two statements (a separate income statement and a statement of comprehensive income). Components of comprehensive income are not permitted to be presented in the statement of changes in equity. In addition, a statement of financial position is required at the beginning of the earliest comparative period following a change in accounting policy, the correction of an error or the reclassification of items in the financial statements. FRS 1 (revised 2008) does not have any impact on the College's financial position or results.

Other than the change in disclosures relating to FRS 1 (revised 2008), the initial application of these standards (including their consequential amendments) and interpretations is not expected to have any material impact on the College's financial statements. The College has not considered the impact of accounting standards issued after the balance sheet date.

The management Committee expects that the adoption of these FRS and INT FRS in the initial period of application will have no material impact on the financial statements.

2.2 Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset. Purchased software that is integral to the functionality of the related equipment is capitalised as part of that equipment.

When parts of an item of plant and equipment have different useful lives, they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of plant and equipment.

The cost of replacing parts of an item of plant and equipment is recognised in the carrying amount of the item if it is probable that the future economic benefits embodied within the part will follow to the College and its cost can be measured reliably. The cost of the day-to-day serving of plant and equipment are recognised in the income statement as incurred.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - 31 MARCH 2009

2) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

2.2 Plant and equipment (continued)

Depreciation on plant and equipment is recognised in the income statement on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives (or leased term, if shorter) of each part of an item of plant and equipment.

The estimated useful lives are as follows:

Furniture and fittings
 3 to 5 years

Office equipment
 1 to 3 years

Other assets3 years

Other assets include painting, potteries, tapes, library, books and other minor assets.

No depreciation is provided for paintings and potteries as they appreciate in value.

Depreciation methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed, and adjusted as appropriate, at each reporting date.

2.3 Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is calculated using the weighted average cost formula and comprises all costs of purchase, costs of conversion and other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition. In the case of manufactured inventories and work-in-progress, cost includes an appropriate share of production overheads based on normal operating capacity. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less the estimated costs of completion and selling expenses.

2.4 Financial Instruments

Non-derivative instruments

Non-derivative financial instruments comprise investments in equity and debt securities, trade and other receivables, cash and cash equivalents, financial liabilities, and trade and other payables.

Non-derivative financial instruments are recognised initially at fair value plus, for instruments not at fair value through profit or loss, any directly attributable transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition, non-derivative financial instruments are measured as described below.

2) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

2.4 Financial Instruments (continued)

Non-derivative instruments (continued)

A financial instrument is recognised if the college becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. Financial assets are derecognised if the college's contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial assets expire or if the college transfers the financial asset to another party without retaining control or transfers substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset. Regular way purchases and sales of financial assets are accounted for at trade date, i.e., the date that the college commits itself to purchase or sell the asset. Financial liabilities are derecognised if the college's obligations specified in the contract expire or are discharged or cancelled.

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash balances and bank deposits. Bank overdrafts that are repayable on demand and that form an integral part of the college's cash management is included as a component of cash and cash equivalents for the purpose of the cash flow statement.

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss

An instrument is classified as at fair value through profit or loss if it is acquired principally for the purpose of selling in the short term or is designated as such upon initial recognition. Financial instruments are designated as fair value through profit or loss if the college manages such investments and makes purchase and sale decisions based on their fair value in accordance with the college's documented risk management and investment strategies. Upon initial recognition, attributable transaction costs are recognised in the income statement when incurred. Financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss are measured at fair value, and changes therein are recognised in the income statement.

Held-to-maturity investments

If the college has the positive intent and ability to hold debt securities to maturity, they are classified as held-to-maturity. Held-to-maturity investments are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment losses.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - 31 MARCH 2009

2) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

2.4 Financial Instruments (continued)

Non-derivative instruments (continued)

Available-for-sale financial assets

The college's investments in certain equity securities and debt securities are classified as available-for-sale financial assets if they are not classified in any of the other categories. Subsequent to initial recognition, they are measured at fair value and changes therein, other than for impairment losses, and foreign exchange gains and losses on available-for-sale monetary items, are recognised directly in equity. When an investment is derecognised, the cumulative gain or loss in equity is transferred to the income statement.

Other

Other non-derivative financial instruments are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment losses.

Share capital

Ordinary shares are classified as equity.

Incremental costs directly attributable to the issue of ordinary shares and share options are recognised as a deduction from equity, net of any tax effects.

When share capital recognised as equity is repurchased (treasury shares), the amount of the consideration paid, including directly attributable costs, net of any tax effects, is presented as a deduction from equity. Where such shares are subsequently reissued, sold or cancelled, the consideration received is recognised as a change in equity. No gain or loss is recognised in the income statement.

2.5 Impairment of assets

Financial assets

A financial asset is assessed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any objective evidence that it is impaired. A financial asset is considered to be impaired if objective evidence indicates that one or more events have had a negative effect on the estimated future cash flows of that asset.

2) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

2.5 Impairment of assets (continued)

Financial assets (continued)

An impairment loss in respect of a financial asset measured at amortised cost is calculated as the difference between its carrying amount, and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the original effective interest rate. An impairment loss in respect of an available-for-sale financial asset is calculated by reference to its current fair value.

Individually significant financial assets are tested for impairment on an individual basis. The remaining financial assets are assessed collectively in groups that share similar credit risk characteristic.

All impairment losses are recognised in the income statement. Any cumulative loss in respect of an available-for-sale financial asset recognised previously in equity is transferred to the income statement.

Impairment losses in respect of financial assets measured at amortised cost and available-for-sale debt securities are reversed if the subsequent increase in fair value can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognised.

Impairment losses once recognised in the income statement in respect of available-for-sale equity securities are not reversed through the income statement. Any subsequent increase in fair value of such assets is recognised directly in equity.

Non-financial assets

The carrying amounts of the college's non-financial assets, other than investment properties, inventories and deferred tax assets are reviewed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists, the assets' recoverable amounts are estimated.

An impairment loss is recognised if the carrying amount of an asset or its cash-generating unit exceeds its estimated recoverable amount. A cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable asset group that generates cash flows that largely are independent from other assets and groups. Impairment losses are recognised in the income statement unless it reverses a previous revaluation, credited to equity, in which case it is charged to equity.

Non-financial assets (continued)

Impairment losses recognised in respect of cash-generating units are allocated first to reduce the carrying amount of any goodwill allocated to the units and then to reduce the carrying amount of the other assets in the unit (group of units) on a pro-rata basis.

The recoverable amount of an asset or cash-generating unit is the greater of its value in use and its fair value less costs to sell. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset or cash-generating unit.

An impairment loss in respect of goodwill is not reversed. In respect of other assets, impairment losses recognised in prior periods are assessed at each reporting date for any indications that the loss has decreased or no longer exists. An impairment loss is reversed if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount. An impairment loss is reversed only to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation or amortisation, if no impairment loss had been recognized.

2.6 Leases

When the college is a lessee of an operating lease

Where the college has the use of assets under operating leases, payments made under the leases are recognised in the income statement on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease. Lease incentives received are recognised in the income statement as an integral part of the total lease payments made. Contingent rentals are charged to the income

2.7 Employee benefits

Defined contribution plans

Defined contribution plans are post-employment benefit plans under which the company pays fixed contributions to the Central Provident Fund on a mandatory, contractual or voluntary basis. The college has no further payment obligations once the contributions have been paid. The college's contributions are recognised as employee compensation expense when they are due, unless they can be capitalised as an asset.

2) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

2.7 Employee benefits (continued)

Employee leave entitlement

Employee entitlements to annual leave are recognised when they accrue to employees. A provision is made for the estimated liability for annual leave as a result of services rendered by employees up to the balance sheet date.

2.8 Provisions

A provision is recognised if, as a result of a past event, the College has present legal or constructive obligation that can be estimated reliably and it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation. Provisions are determined by discounting the expected future cash flows at a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability.

2.9 Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the College and the revenue can be reliably measured.

Members' annual subscription are recognised when due.

Course fees (from continuing professional education and training) are recognised when the services are rendered.

Advertising income is recognised when advertisement is placed.

Interest income is recognised as the interest accrues based on effective interest rate method unless collectibility is in doubt.

Management fee charged by the College is recognised when due.

2.10 Finance income and expenses

Finance income comprises interest income on funds invested. Interest income is recognised as it accrues, using the effective interest method.

Finance expenses comprise interest expense on borrowings and unwinding of the discount on provisions. All borrowing costs are recognised in the income statement using the effective interest method, except to the extent that they are capitalised as being directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of as asset which necessarily takes a substantial period of time to be prepared for its intended use or sale.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - 31 MARCH 2009

2) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

2.11 Grants and sponsorship

Grants are recognised at their fair value where there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attaching condition will be complied with. When the grant relates to an expense item, it is recognised in the Income and Expenditure Statement over the periods necessary to match them on a systematic basis, to the costs, which it is intended to compensate. Where the grant relates to an asset, the fair value is credited to a deferred income account and is released to the Income and Expenditure Statement over the expected useful life of the relevant asset by equal annual installments.

2.12 Income tax expenses

The Society has been registered as a Society under the Societies Act. With effect from the Year of Assessment 2008, the requirement for Society to spend at least 80% of their annual receipts on charitable objects in Singapore within 2 years in order to enjoy income tax exemption has been removed. As a registered and exempt charity it will enjoy automatic income tax exemption.

The College places its cash and fixed deposits with creditworthy institutions.

The carrying amount of financial assets recorded in the financial statements, net of any provision of losses, represents the College's maximum exposure to credit risk.

Liquidity risk

In the management of liquidity risk, the College monitors and maintains a level of cash and bank balances deemed adequate by the Management to finance the College's operations and mitigate the effects of fluctuations in cash flows.

Foreign currency risk

The College has no significant exposure to foreign currency risk.

Fair value of financial assets and financial liabilities

The carrying amount of financial assets and financial liabilities recorded in the financial statements represents their respective net fair values.



HERALDRY OF THE COLLEGE

The upper portion of the badge of the College consists of a golden lion in a passant stance superimposed on the chief which is red in colour.

The lion represents our nation of Singapore. Red is the colour of blood which is the precious liquid on which life depends and which is our mission to save.

The lower portion of the badge consists of a green cross superimposed on a white shield. The green cross symbolizes the humanitarian mission of our College. White is the colour of purity which is our aim.

On the green cross is superimposed an open book and a caduceus. The open book represents knowledge and continued learning and the caduceus is the recognized symbol for the art of healing.
